What is a waste sort and why do one?

A waste sort is a formal, structured process used to quantify the amount and types of waste being generated. Information from audits will help identify current waste practices and how they can be improved. Being waste-wise can mean:


- x A more efficient and effective school

- x Better use of limited natural resources




